They formed an **Expedition into the Interior**, mounted their horses and followed a Native American path called the Saginaw Trail (we call it Woodward Avenue now) until they got to about 13 Mile Road — when they headed northwesterly toward the first of a series of lakes.

“As we knew of no names that they had hitherto received, we thought it expedient to give them some, and designated most of those we saw by the names of the explorers.”

That’s how Wing, Cass and Elizabeth lakes got their names. Nine others did as well and their story along with the rest of the Expedition — as told in the November 13, 1818 *Detroit Gazette* — will be the subject of a multimedia presentation led by four of our local historians.
